
















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
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The Flats

In the waters of Middlesex County where the mouth of Jackson Creek meets the Piankatank River lies a popular sand bridge the locals call "The Flats."

According to lifelong Deltaville resident Barry Miller, The Flats has been and always will be the place to be while traveling up and down the river and the Chesapeake Bay.

On one side of The Flats is the Piankatank, which is more shallow immediately off the sandbar and gradually gets deeper. The Jackson Creek side is much deeper right off of the sand.

Because of the makeup of the sandbar, Miller said it is the ideal place to learn how to waterski.

"It's the perfect place to learn because you can have the person trying to learn get set up right off of the sand on the Jackson Creek side and the boat can pull up right to you to get them started. It's a great spot to avoid the stinging nettles when you're working to get up on the skis," he said.

Miller, who's been a frequent visitor of The Flats for over 50 years, said some of his best memories are teaching his three kids, Braeden, Kaytlyn and Brennen how to ski off the sandbar's shore.

"I'm pretty sure I've taught just about everyone in Deltaville how to ski off of The Flats," Miller said.

Over the decades, Miller said he's seen the sandbar attract visitors and his neighbors alike, consistently hosting a number of boaters each weekend in the summer.

"Over the years I've actually seen it become a very family-oriented spot. There's a lot of young families I see there now spending time with their kids," he said.

While Miller still pays visits to The Flats, he couldn't help but chuckle at the memory of his teenage side-hustle that took place near the sandbar.

"It doesn't happen that much now that everyone's got the computerized navigational systems, but back in the day because the channel markers leading to The Flats are posted a little worky, a lot of boats used to run-aground. My buddies and I would hang out around the channel markers waiting to pull the other boaters out. They'd tip us and that was our beer and gas money for the weekend," he said.

Ideal for learning the ways of some water sports and enjoying the sunshine with your loved ones, The Flats is an area icon for boaters in Middlesex to enjoy their summer days.

Where the York River and Mobjack Bay meet at the lower point of the Middle Peninsula, boaters frequent the sand for its good time vibes and gorgeous sunsets.

Henry George, an avid recreational fisherman, says there's no better day than starting early in the morning before the sunrises and getting out on the surrounding waters to do some fishing, particularly for cobia, catching his limit and coming back to spend the rest of the day at New Point with his friends and family.

"It's been a family tradition, really. I look forward to summer all year long for those long days on the water," he said.

There's also a number of waterfront restaurants, like Hole in the Wall, with boat slips for folks to come by after they're done soaking in the rays for a drink and bite to eat all while continuing to enjoy the stunning views they'd been taking in all that day.


"There's no better day than heading out that way. Every chance I can when the weather is right, I'm trying to get out on the water and definitely stopping by Navlors," she said.

In the lower Northern Neck in Lancaster County in Little Bay, not far from the mouth of the Rappahannock River, lies an island everyone knows as the premier party spot: Cedars.

Just a hop, skip and a jump from Windmill Point, Cedars attracts tens of thousands of boaters each and every summer.

Adorned with a make-shift tiki hut, a volleyball net and a contagious island spirit, Cedars serves as a gathering place among boaters enjoying a day on the water.

"I've been going to Cedars since the early 1990s in the summers of high school. It's always just been a little slice of heaven right here at home, even though it makes you feel like you're not home at all." Brenda Elbourn said.

Because of Cedars' proximity to a number of boat ramps, including the public boat ramp at Windmill Point Marina, it makes for a perfect island getaway you don't have to go very far to get to. Depending on your launch point along Windmill Point Road, on calmer days the island can be manageably reached by kayak.

While the 135-acre parcel that is the island has been on and off the real estate market for a number of years, it remains the go-to place for many.

Walking the shore of the island on most weekends you're certain to come across folks with country and beach music playing through their speakers, kids practicing their skim boarding techniques on the island's shallow canal and plenty of iced down coolers.

Depending on the winds, tides and weather in general, Cedars offers a variety of atmospheres depending on the day and time of year.


According to Matt Owens, Cedars is different day-to-day, but consistently one of the best places to be regardless of the amount of people or state of the tides.

"The vibe depends on the day. One day it's a crazy party with tons of people around you, and your boat hardly fits on shore. Other days it's empty and the most relaxing place you can think of," he said.

Like many islands and beaches, it's one of those places boaters know they need to enjoy while they can. With the effect of erosion and storms, frequent visitors have taken note to the island's shrinkage over the years.

"Cedars is changing significantly year to year. I was visiting our beloved hometown sandbar often a few summers ago and have had to rediscover my bearings because of the sands shifting and depth changing," Lancaster County resident Braiden Kent said.

As Mosquito Point, a beloved island for both Middlesex and Lancaster residents, has completely washed away over the last several years, boaters are finding the importance of appreciating precious islands and sandbars before they become fond memories of yesteryear.

Certainly each island has its own community feel and atmosphere, however, if you're in the mood to explore an entire island town, just jet across the bay to Tangier Island about 19 miles from Reedville to explore a community like no other.

Tangier Island is an inhabited island in the Chesapeake Bay with about 300 residents. Tangier is known for its one-of-a-kind island culture, delicious crab cakes and stunning beach front.

A history buff would enjoy docking at one of the island's piers and visiting the impressive museum or simply walking around the Island.

While Tangier brings in thousands of visitors each year, natives to the Island come back to visit after moving away because there's simply "no place like home."

Layla Parks, who has been off the Island and living on the mainland for about seven years says going back to her roots and visiting Tangier is so special, especially now that she has her son, Ryder, to share her love of the Island with.

"When I go back to visit I just feel right at home. I remember the old days of when I was younger and all of the memories I've made over the years and I'm so happy I can share that with my son," she said.

For those who want to have an island excursion but don't have a boat of their own, Tangier is a great place to explore. The Tangier Cruise makes day trips from Buzzard Point Marina regularly throughout the summer at an affordable price point.

Whether you're sunset chasing, working on catching a citation, or just looking for a good time, there's a number of spots in and around the bay to enjoy summer excursions. After all, when in Rivah Country, there's no better way to get familiar with the area than exploring the waterways and the islands and sandbars that fill them. Island culture and community is something special and all are welcome to see it for themselves.



an abundance of fish to the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries. With water temperatures in the 80s, conditions are prime for great fishing. If temperatures get any hotter, the fish will be poached before they reach the boat.

There is great action both inshore and in deeper bay waters. Among the species available are: speckled trout, puppy drum, bluefish, Spanish mackerel and a variety of bottom feeders.

Catch your dinner

A proven method of catching both bluefish and Spanish mackerel is trolling. Dragging either Drone or Clark spoons will simulate the small shiners and minnows that make up their diet. My rigs are adorned with a variety of colors from silver and gold to chartreuse and even pink. Size 0 and 1 are the most effective for the 1-3 pound class fish, while larger blues often require the use of artificial eels commonly referred to as "surgical tube eels." The longer lure counters their sharp teeth and deep, aggressive bites.

The trolling speed varies between species with bluefish preferring four to five knots and mackerel preferring swifter moving baits of six knots. You will need to use some method of placing your lures deeper. Using a #1 planer will eliminate heavy inline sinkers. These work well since most of the fish feed at or within 15 feet of the surface.

Bluefish can also be caught while chumming at anchor. This method utilizes ground menhaden for chum and chunks of the same baited on long shank hooks.

In Virginia, the bluefish creel limit is three fish per person for recreational anglers and five per person on charter boats. Anglers are afforded 15 mackerel per day.

Inshore fishing offers plenty of speckled trout and redfish action. The shallows of the rivers and their tributaries are holding the best numbers of redfish in years. Live baits such as spot, minnows and chunks of peeler crab work best, but artificial baits and top water lures are catching as well. Speckled trout can be found in

many of the same areas as drum like grass flats, oyster beds, and channel banks. The same offerings are effective while fishing for trout. You may keep three drum 18-26" and five trout over 14". I promote the release of all 20-plus inch trout to save the spawning stock

How to fix 'em

SMOKED FISH

When smoking is associated with cooking, some folks think about burnt pans and smoke alarms going off in the kitchen. Don't worry, in this case, smoke is a good thing!

PREPARING TO SMOKE

It is important to keep your fish iced down as soon as you land them. This keeps the meat firm and fresh. At the dock, scale and filet the bluefish, leaving the skin attached. Mackerel have a much smoother skin with very fine scales. Simply rub and rinse skin, then filet. Then carefully cut out the belly cavity and the pin bones that are located just behind the gill plates near the center line. Rinse off blood and residual scales and place back on ice.

The next step is to soak the fish in brine. It enhances the flavor and also helps fish to retain moisture through the smoking process. Mix ingredients of brine and make sure that fish are completely covered. Place in the refrigerator for 4-8 hours. The longer, the saltier.

BRINE

2 quarts water 1/2 cup sea salt or Kosher salt 1/4 cup Sugar Soy Sauce (optional)

Smokin'

Smoke doesn't like to stick to wet surfaces, so, the next step is as important as the brine. When you take the fish out of the brine, place the filets on a metal rack above a few layers of newspapers. Allow the fish to dry for several hours, until the surface of the fish is dry and feels a bit tacky to the touch. It will take a few hours to dry at room temperature and longer in the refrigerator. That dry, sticky surface is called a "pellicle," and it is formed by proteins on the surface of the fish as they are exposed to air. The pellicle will give the smoke a good surface to adhere to and protect the fish from giving up too much moisture while it's in vour smoker.

Once dry, generously add coarsely ground peppercorn with a touch of lemon peel and paprika. Press into fish and they're ready to smoke.

Bring the temperature of the

smoker up to 180-200 F. Place filets either directly on racks or on tray. The process takes between 1.5-2.5 hours depending on level of heat. Larger, thicker filets may need more time. Toward the end of the smoking process—maybe the final half hour-you may add a small amount of honey to the surface of a few filets. Brown sugar also works. That sweet touch adds a nice finish and enhances the taste. If you have a temperature probe, the interior meat is fully smoked at 140 F. Another telltale sign it's ready is when the edges begin to curl up slightly.

Smoking note: bluefish has a strong flavor, so choose your smoking wood accordingly. You may want to go with an assertive smoke like mesquite, hickory or even walnut or cherry to hold up to the taste of the fish rather than choosing a mild wood like maple or apple, which is better suited for milder fish like trout.

If you make this recipe, your neighbors may be lined up as far back as the funnel cake line at the Kilmarnock Firemen's Festival. Keep in mind that the Surgeon General has determined that smoking fish is good for your health...just don't inhale.

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

ne of the greatest race horses of all time was Exterminator, owned by Willis Sharpe Kilmer of Remlik Hall, (Kilmer spelled backwards) in Middlesex County.

When Kilmer's mansion burned in 1939, three large murals of Kilmer's most famous horses, Exterminator, Sun Briar and Sun Beau were among the first things removed from the fire. Today, they are in Saratoga Springs, New York, at the National Museum of Horse Racing and Hall of Fame.

Exterminator was the 1918 Kentucky Derby winner and named in 1922 "Horse of the Year." Kilmer bought Exterminator as a workhorse to help train his prized horse Sun Briar. Kilmer had little respect for him. He called him the "goat" or "that truck horse." In 1918 when Sun Briar was injured Exterminator got the nod to run in the Kentucky Derby.

a 30-1 long shot to win the derby. Exterminator ran last most of the way until the homestretch when he passed all to win the race by a horse length.

When Exterminator got old he lived at the horse's main keeper. "I was to keep Ole Bones' stall just like a house was kept," said Bray in a 1983 interview. "Grooming Exterminator was a daily chore. I'd clean Ole Bones real good, and Kilmer would come in with his white gloves on and rub across his back. If there was any dirt on his gloves, I'd have to

clean him all over again.

"Exterminator had a companion pony named Peanut that stayed with the derby winner all the time," he said. "There were two buckets in the stall, one for the champ and the other for Peanut. Ole Bones would not eat until Peanut had his meal. There were two Peanuts. When the first one died, it created quite a problem. Ole Bones, as the horse was often called, was When the pony died, Exterminator dug a hole in his stall as deep as this chair I'm sitting in and wouldn't let anyone in. It took three men holding him to get the dead pony out of the

"Kilmer bought a new pony and when I put Remlik Hall, and Milford "Pitchfork" Bray was him in the stall, Ole Bones came at him with his mouth open as if to bite him," said Bray. "The pony gave him a good kick and after that they were good friends."















Mathews Market Days to cele at 50t, ye a"

here is a place that time almost forgot. Here, good things from the past are still good. At summer's end, people gather in and around the historic Mathews Court Green as they have done for decades. Brick buildings that slumber much of the time, awaken. Under shady trees local folks display their handiwork, foods, art, and more.

Food and craft vendors set up, bands play, people dance, pets parade, children play, folks visit, and schools close for the day in what is geographically Virginia's second smallest county.

Anniversary

Mathews Market Days celebrates its 50th anniversary on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 6 and 7 with first-time-ever happenings and revived attractions from the past.

The idea of a showing off handiwork, whatever it might be, is similar to the "county fairs" of the past, when farmers would show off their produce and prized animals, home makers would bake cakes and pies and cookies, organizations might sew quilts, all vying for the blue ribbon top prize.

From these roots was born Mathews Market Days.

It was an effort to bring people to the business district at Mathews Courthouse. And if it only attracted the people of Mathews County, that was enough. Bigger is not always better. Market Days is still a visitor friendly event. Cars can still be driven on the main streets. Only two streets are closed so vendors can set up.

Beginnings

Even though Market Days grew much larger and more diverse, "it is still exciting to see it all come together," wrote the late Mildred P. Hudgins in September 2000 in an article for the Gloucester-Mathews Gazette Journal, recalling Market Days memories. Hudgins' article said it was the late Lillian Rau who came to her office at the Virginia Cooperative Extension Agency with the idea of an event for Mathews artists, craftsmen, homemakers, and everyone to display their work.

Through her position with the extension office, Hudgins had seen the variety of talent in the Mathews County kitchens and home shops and liked Rau's idea.

History

It's been said the newspapers write the first draft of history. Well, the Gloucester-Mathews Gazette-Journal newspaper has covered Mathews County for more than 85 years and is probably the only place where the Market Days "history" can be found.

The following are excerpts from the news reports.

The first event called "Mathews Days" was offered on a vacant lot on Main Street. It had 12 vendors, mostly selling food, and merchants joined with sales and promotions. The Mathews County Historical Society conducted a bake sale at the Tompkins Cottage on the second day of Mathews Days. There was an auction, craft demonstrations, and an art show. The event drew 1,000 people and it profited \$238 which was given to various charities.

More room needed

In 1977, Market Days was set up on the Mathews Court Green, where it has been ever since. A "Food Fair" was added in 1986, as Market Days took on the flavor of a county fair.

The September 1989 Market Days had more than 100 booths, and again the vendors agreed to donate 10% of their proceeds to the Market Days committee, which in turn donated the funds collected to a community cause. Over 14 years, funds from vendors totaled

Volunteers

Mildred Hudgins noted in her article nearly 24 years ago, "Without the support and interest of all those who have volunteered to chair the event and to help on committees or just to help where even needed, Mathews Market Days would've ended long ago.'

Hudgins' words still ring true with this year's festival chairman Jennifer Roahrig.

When asked to describe Mathews Market Days is a word, Roahrig replied, "Community, that would be my word. Mathews Market Days is "an event for the community by the community."

Dee Russell, who served as chairman of Market Market Days for four years (from 2013-2016), said, "We have managed as a citizens and through volunteers to keep this very small quaint event successful. It speaks of the heart of the people of Mathews. It's volunteerism. No matter what, people stand up to the plate

Russell said Market Days cleared \$20,000 in 2016, which was donated to causes for children. Some of the money came from

Mathews business district will be abuzz on Sept. 6-7 when Mathews Market Days celebrates 50 years. The show begins at 9 a.m. both days and on Saturday following the national anthem, a Virginia Army National Guard M101 cannon will fire a blank round to start the day.

Crab races are back this year and will be held throughout both days. Racers are supplied and contestants squirt them with water to hurry them down the chute.

Beer and wine

This year for the first time in Mathews Market Days history, beer and wine will be served at the street dance on Saturday from 6 -9 p.m., when "The Detonators" play favorite rock songs from the 80's to today.

During the street dance visitors can purchase wine from Zoll Vineyards and beer from The Gloucester Brewing Company. Alcohol will not be available except during the dance.

Vendors

So far, 42 art and crafts vendors have registered, and there will be 11 food vendors, and 11 information booths. Also new to Mathews Market Days this year is a children's block party. "DJ Dreux" promises a "glow party" to not be forgotten! The glow party will take place Friday, September 6 from 6 to 8 p.m. at the Put in Creek Pavilion.

Children's area


A free children's area includes a rock climbing wall, inflatable water slide, face painting, balloon artists and tons of free games.

# Big portions, big ~avor at Big Oak

f it's a hearty meal at a reasonable price in a quaint atmosphere you're seeking, L then you'll find it a few miles outside of Urbanna at the Big Oak Cafe.

Named after the large oak tree that flanks the little red cottage at the intersection of Old Virginia Street and Racetrack Road in Middlesex County, the cafe is owned by DeeDee Morris. A former stockbroker who enjoyed cooking for her children and their friends, she bought the building in 2013 and after two years of renovations opened the restaurant as a breakfast and lunch cafe in 2015.

The building had been vacant for over 30 years and was being used for storage.

Morris initially wanted to pattern her cafe after a popular chain restaurant offering speciality sandwiches, salads and sides but quickly "realized that was going to be a long, hard way to make a living.

"Breakfast is not expensive to do," she added. "But it's labor intensive. So I said to myself let's do dinner on Monday and Tuesday when most of the other places are closed." She also offers dinner on Thursdays and lunch every day

except Wednesday. She also started offering theme nights, which

quickly became popular. Monday is half-price burger night; Tuesday, prime rib night; and Thursday includes a 5-7 p.m. "happy hour" which features \$1 wings, \$1 shrimp and halfprice beer and wine.

My husband and I and a few friends ventured across the Rappahannock River on a Tuesday night a few weeks ago, unaware it was prime rib night. Well, my husband's eyes lit up when he heard our waitress Tiffany

offer prime rib as a special. It's among his favorites. Mine too. But I wanted to add variety to my review, so I opted for a rib eye with a crab cake add on. The surf and turf combo wasn't on wine. Open every day. B/L/\$-\$\$.



his liking and made a fantastic leftover dinner the following night. Although we didn't order drinks, the restaurant offers a good selection of beer and wines.

An on-premise garden of tomatoes and herbs added a fresh touch to our garden

"I call Tuesday night the fancy night," said Morris, who has done and still does all of the cooking. "It's slow dine night. Have a glass or two of wine while you wait for your prime

The specials board also included a lengthy

list of homemade desserts so we had to try two. On Tiffany's recommendation I ordered the almond cake and pecan pie. The cake was almost misnamed. The bottom layer was a

thin flaky dough and the cake itself was a thick layer of almond cream topped with nut sprinkles. It was very deceiving at first bite but a sweet surprise. Our dining companions ordered a cheesecake chimmi, which was a creamy crispy shell filled with cheesecake and strawberries, sprinkled with powdered sugar—think deep fried sweet burrito.

And the pecan pie must have been good. It disappeared before I could get a taste.

Almost all of Morris' desserts are made by The Pie Lady and Company in West Point. Morris' daughter likes to make cheesecake.

Apparently the restaurant's breakfast items are also yummy. Morris said the softshell crab Benedict, part of her Sunday brunch, is very popular during in the summer. And in the fall, her oysters and eggs are all the rage.

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# PORTRAYALS OF HISTORICAL FIGURES TO HIGHLIGHT URBANNA FOUNDERS DAY

"What's happening in the war?" "What has the Second Continental Congress meeting in Philadelphia resolved?" What in the world is happening at the Fifth Virginia Revolutionary Convention in Williamsburg?"

These questions will be answered by historical interpreters portraying 18th century patriots and Founding Fathers Richard Henry Lee and George Mason. Their conversation, which will take place in the critical timeframe of late June 1776, will be showcased at this year's Urbanna Founders Day's presentation at 11 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 3, at Urbanna Baptist Church at 121 Watling Street, Urbanna.

'The World Turned Upside Down" is an apt name for this living history presentation, because it happened at a time when neither Founding Father knew whether or not a new nation would be birthed. Listen to their discussion, see the tension grow, and experience the strategies and thoughts of Lee and Mason as they share their experience of the Revolutionary War and nation-building events.

Seats are limited to this free event, and the doors will close at 11 a.m. as Frank Megargee portrays Richard Henry Lee and Douglas Cohen brings George Mason to life for this educational and memorable performance to celebrate the 10th anniversary of Urbanna Founders Day.

Richard Henry Lee, a statesman of the well-known Lee Family of Virginia, was passionate in supporting the cause of independence from Great Britain. He served in the Virginia House of Burgesses and later the House of Delegates, signed the Declaration of Independence, was president of the Continental Congress, and also served as a senator from Virginia in the new nation. He worked to stop the impor-

each played a significant role in Amerca's years to forming the structure of the new American government. He opposed the new Constitution until the Bill of Rights was added. A prominent historian has said of Lee that "his legacy is intrinsic, albeit anonymous, in the founding documents of the United States."

> Lee is perhaps best known for delivering a fiery motion at the Second Continental Congress to declare independence from Britain. This motion, known as the Lee Resolution, passed the Congress,

were then tasked to write the Declaration of Independence. John Adams later remarked to Abagail Adams that Lee would be known as the "Father of American Independence."

George Mason, a wealthy Fairfax County planter who became a revolutionary, was active in local committees of safety and correspondence, and also served in the House of Burgesses and later the House of Delegates. He, too, worked to ban the African slave trade and exercised a significant influence on American political thoughts and events. As a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, he, like Lee, refused to sign the new Constitution until it contained a Bill of Rights. Historians have stated that Mason's greatest contribution to present day Constitutional law was his influence on our Bill of Rights.

Mason is likely best known as an architect of the American Revolution and wrote Virginia's Declaration of Rights and the Virginia Constitution, naming the new state the "Commonwealth of Virginia," a name he chose to indicate that power stemmed from the people. These two documents had a profound influence on the formation of the new nation. Thomas Jefferson paid homage to Mason by incorporating both Mason's ideas and language into the Declaration of Independence.

Portraying Lee, homebuilder Frank Megargee's interest in Colonial Tidewater architecture led him to Colonial Williamsburg from Maryland's Eastern Shore. As he immersed himself in colonial history, he discovered "a giant of the period who had been reduced to a footnote: R.H. Lee." Frank has done a deep dive into all-things-Lee and has portrayed Lee, and other historical figures, as part of Colonial Williamsburg's "Revolutionary City" Street Theater program.

Bringing George Mason to life, Douglas Cohen is a third-generation Washingtonian and worked in a number of civilian and military federal organizations before retiring and moving to Williamsburg. A member of the Living History Foundation, he has portrayed several colonial personages and has become deeply acquainted with the life and works of George Mason, whom he represents at Gunston Hall, Mason's ancestral home in Mason Neck, Virginia.

Essex County's history in written form dates from Captain John Smith's visit during the winter of 1607-08, when he wrote of the "excellent, pleasant, fertile, and navigable" Rappahan-

nock Valley.

In 1645 Bartholomew Hoskins patented the Tappahannock site, which became known at various times as Hobbs His Hole, Hobb's Hole, the shortlived New Plymouth, and the Indian name Tappahannock. The port town was to become a center of commerce during the 17th and 18th centuries, establishing a crossroads.

The Essex Courthouse contains some of the oldest records in Virginia. James B. Slaughter's history of the area, "Settlers, Southerners, Americans: The History of Essex County, Virginia 1608-1984," recounts in detail the county's 350-year-old story. The book is available at the county administrator's office.

Today Essex's town of Tappahannock is one of the largest commercial centers in the region.

# **History**

Exploration of what would become Gloucester County began soon after 1607 when Jamestown, the first permanent English settlement in the New World, was started 25 miles to its south.

Gloucester was home to Pocahontas, daughter of Indian Chief Powhatan. According to legend, she petitioned her father to spare the life of English explorer Captain John Smith, who was one of the first white men to see the area in the early 1600s.

Another infamous resident was Nathaniel Bacon who, in 1676, led a force of planters against the Indians. His army burned Jamestown and he briefly controlled the colony before his death ended the revolt.

Fortified during Bacon's Rebellion, Gloucester Point (originally called Tyndall's Point), is just across the York River from Yorktown, site of the British surrender to end the American Revolution.

When Jamestown was burned by Bacon in 1676, the Virginia Executive Council considered moving the state capital to Tyndall's Point, but the motion was

# **History**

Discover America's past and create unforgettable memories in Lancaster. Miles of scenic shoreline and infinite activities make it the ideal location for today's vacationers, retirees and residents.

Capt. John Smith is believed to be the first Englishman to set foot in the county when he explored the Chesapeake Bay region in 1607, encountering the Moraughtacunds (Morrattico) and Cuttatawomen (Corrotoman) tribes.

Today, you'll find descendants of the earliest colonists still living in Lancaster.

Henry Fleet sailed to the new world in 1621 as a boy and was captured and raised by Native Americans until ransomed to the colonists. Later, Capt. Fleet settled 1,760 acres of land from Fleet's Bay to Irvington.

The Carter family was extremely influential. Robert "King" Carter grew his father's 2.600 estate to over 300.000 acres on 48 plantations with some 1.000 slaves. Carter fathered 15 children. His descendants include eight governors of Virginia, three signers of the Declaration of Independence, two presidents, leader of the confederate armies Gen. Robert E. Lee, and a Supreme Court Justice. The family's history is archived in the museum at Historic Christ Church.

George Washington's mother, Mary Ball, was born about 1708 at Epping Forrest in upper Lancaster. Learn the Ball family history, or discover your own, at the Mary Ball Washington Museum's extensive genealogy library in historic Lancaster Courthouse.

Learn more local history at the Irvington Steamboat Era Museum, Morraticco Waterfront Museum and Kilmarnock Museum.

# **History**

Mathews County was an established shipbuilding center for the Chesapeake Bay when it broke away from Gloucester in 1791 to become a separate county.

About that time, 12 sailing ships over 20 tons each were built in a single year in Mathews, which the Chiskiake Indians had called Werowocomico.

Between 1790 and 1820, approximately a third of ships built in Virginia came from Mathews. The sharp, fast vessels, popularly known as Baltimore Clippers, were built throughout the Chesapeake Bay region. Before the War of 1812, these fast ships were simply known as "Virginia built."

From 1802 to 1844, Mathews was an official port of entry for the registration and enrollment of ships. During this period, 10,000 vessels called at the "Port of East River." The customs house stood at Williams Wharf (marker 13), which was a center of maritime activity until the steamers quit running in the 1940s.

The last remaining steamboat line, the Old Bay Line, stopped its York River to Baltimore run in 1942. About 20 years later, the Old Bay Line dropped passenger service between Baltimore and Norfolk. The steamers stopped for good in the spring of 1962.

Mathews has a population of around 8,900. While it is Virginia's second smallest county with only 87 square miles, it has more miles of shore than any other Bay county and some of the area's best public access.

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

# Historv

Middlesex County was formed in 1668 from Lancaster County, making it one of the oldest English settlements in

the United States. Throughout the county several colonial plantation homes and structures still stand from the Colonial era.

Bordered by the Rappahannock and Piankatank rivers and the Chesapeake Bay, much of its history centers around the water. The town of Urbanna was formed in 1680 as an official center for shipping tobacco grown on surrounding plantations.

Stingray Point near Deltaville gained immortal fame in 1608 as the spot where Captain John Smith was nearly killed by a stingray. Throughout the 20th century, Deltaville was a wooden boatbuilding center and from that infrastructure grew into a major boating center on Chesapeake Bay.

Today Middlesex County is home to the popular Urbanna Oyster Festival, which draws thousands for a weekend of music and mollusks every November.

# **History**

Northumberland's blend of history and nature will appeal to all ages.

Originally home to the Chickacoan and Wicocomico tribes of the Powhatan Confederacy, adventurers will enjoy combing beaches and nature trails for arrowheads while armchair explorers might prefer touring museum artifacts.

Jamestown's colonial government created Northumberland in 1648, which encompassed most of the Northern Neck and was named after County Northumberland, England. Within five years, Lancaster, Richmond and Westmoreland counties had been carved out of its territory, making Northumberland the "Mother County of the Northern Neck."

The rapid growth of colonial settlements after 1635 pushed the Native Americans to 4,400-acres off Dividing Creek. Formerly independent tribes consolidated into one village, the Rappahannock Tribe. By 1700 they disappeared from local records.

Historic Heathsville grew up around the county seat which was established in 1679, and named for local leader John Heath, whose brick home is still standing in town on Rowe's Landing Road. Courthouse Square features Rice's Hotel/Hughlett's Tavern, now a gift shop and museum. It includes a blacksmith shop, old jail, carriage house and commons for farmers markets and county events.

Reedville is a picturesque fishing village featuring the Victorian homes of 19th century steamship captains. Off Fleeton Road is Omega Protein, the largest menhaden processing factory on the Eastern seaboard. Reedville Fishermen's Museum showcases the area's fishing industry.

With 1,000 miles of shoreline, charter fishing boats abound. Take a cruise to Tangier or Smith islands.

# History

Known as the Gateway to the Northern Neck, Richmond County was established in 1692 from the old Rappahannock County.

Originally explored by Captain John Smith in 1607-1608, the county was settled in 1640 when people migrated up from settlements below the Rappahannock River. It was presumably named after the First Duke of Richmond, cousin to both King William III and Queen Mary. One of the early settlers was Colonel Moore Fauntleroy, who patented land in the county in 1650.

The first county seat was thought to be at the mouth of Little Carter's Creek, then moved to Navlors, an early river settlement. The seat moved inland in 1730 and was renamed the Richmond County Courthouse. In 1831, the name was changed to Warsaw in sympathy with the Polish struggle for independence. Warsaw was incorporated as the county's only town in 1947.

The Downing Bridge was built across the Rappahannock River in 1927, connecting Richmond County to Essex and opening up travel to and from the Northern Neck. The bridge replaced 200 years of ferry service.

Richmond County was home of the last president elected under the Articles of Confederation. In 1788, Judge Cyrus Griffin was elected president of the U.S. Congress Assembly and held that position until the U.S. Constitution was adopted and his successor, George Washington, was elected as the first U.S. President.

William A. Jones gained recognition for Richmond County in 1916 when, in supporting self-government for all people, he authorized a bill that guaranteed independence for the Philippines. In 1926, the people of the Philippines erected a memorial at Jones' gravesite in the St. John's Episcopal Churchyard in Warsaw.

Serving as the crossroads of U.S. Route 360 and State Route 3, the county seat of Warsaw is currently the headquarters for many regional government agencies as well as a community college, vocational center and regional jail.

# Westmoreland County



# **History**

Established in 1653 by the colonial government in Jamestown, Westmoreland County was named for a British shire. The county's most significant contributions to history include its fostering of more statesmen than any other county in the country, and for the Leedstown Resolutions.

Considered the forerunner of the Declaration of Independence, the Leedstown Resolutions were signed in February, 1766. Prepared by Richard Henry Lee, the document was signed by 115 patriots who bound themselves together "To Prevent The Execution of The Stamp Act.

Stratford Hall was the boyhood home of Richard Henry Lee and Francis Lightfoot Lee, signers of the Declaration of Independence.

General Henry "Light-Horse Harry" Lee was a Revolutionary War hero and served as one of General George Washington's most trusted officers. He is the father of Robert E. Lee.

General Robert E. Lee was born in 1807 at Stratford Hall. Lee was a colonel in the U. S. Army when the Civil War broke out. Offered the command of the Union Army, Lee declined because he "could take no part in an invasion" of his homeland.

Most notable among the statesmen of Westmoreland, George Washington was born at Popes Creek in 1732.

James Monroe, the nation's fifth president, was born in 1758 on a farm near Monroe

Westmoreland is home to the only off-track betting casino in the area. Fishing and agriculture are still the area's mainstays, with wineries, produce farms and seafood packers among some of the most prominent businesses in the county.
